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The Welcome Swallow Gallery is both proud and excited to present the exhibition, Botanica. The combination of art and science upon which the exhibition compositions are anchored comes exclusively from the artists who are members of the Botanical Arts Society of New Zealand (BASNZ). Accordingly, Botanica is co-presented by the Gallery and BASNZ.

The basic difference between a botanical artist and a flower painter is intention: the botanical artist produces work useful to science. This is reflected in the golden age of botanical art from around 1750 to 1850, a period of intense scientific discovery. Each exhibition painting is therefore botanically accurate, often displaying roots, seeds and buds as well as flowers and leaves.

Historically, botanical art is typically with the florilegium associated aspirations of the Captain Cook 1769 explorations with Joseph Banks and his illustrator Sydney Parkinson. However, the original botanical artist is generally recognized to be Maria Sibylla Merian (1647-1717), a German born naturalist and scientific illustrator. As an insect specialist, her botanic compositions often included insect illustrations. In this exhibition, Gillian Receveur continues this tradition with her Kaka Beak and Pohutukawa paintings.

During the mid 20<sup>th</sup> Century, Scottish renaissance personality **Rory McEwen** presented forensic-level illustrations of leaf patterns from fervent life to decay and disintegration. This genre has been beautifully presented by several exhibition artists, including **Lesley Alexander, Claire Broughton** and **Birgit Rhode.** 

Dissecting and illustrating the life of plants on a singular canvas is captured superbly by Janet Marshall, and Lesley Alexander. Their work has strong scientific antecedents in the work of Franz Bauer (1758-1840) from Austria who worked for Joseph Banks and Kew Gardens where he spent much of his life producing famous compositions such as, Illustrations of orchidaceous plants. Using a different methodology, Annette multiple Judd uses singular compositions to closely examine different aspects of a plant's structure.

**Lisa Dickson** deliciously provides clinical yet vivacious splashes of red in the colour of Apple Blossom, Clematis and Tulip. Finally, **Jennifer Duval-Smith's** artichoke diptych brings **Elizabeth Blackwell's** 1737 rendition of the species, dancing into the present day.

This exhibition affirms the intrinsic value of botanical art. Its critical task is discovering, recording and protecting plant species and their ecologies that are the basis of life on Earth. A renaissance worthy of celebrating with this exhibition. *Botanica*.

Founded in April 2004, the Botanical Art Society of New Zealand (BASNZ) was originally based in Christchurch in the South Island. Members met each week at the Girl Guide Centre and when numbers increased, they moved to the Bathhouse in the grounds of Mona Vale Homestead.

Our thriving society has won group medals such as Silver at the 'Ellerslie Flower Show' and individual members have won medals at the RHS Botanical Art Show in the UK and contributed to 'The Highgrove Florilegium' sponsored by the Prince of Wales Trust and the Transylvanian Florilegium. Nearer home, members have been winners of the *Margaret Stoddard Award* and the Botanical Society of Otago's *Audrey Eagle* competition among others.

Over the past few years there has been a huge resurgence of interest in botanical art and in 2018, the very successful 'Botanical Art Worldwide' saw twentyfive countries simultaneously hold exhibitions showing the latest contemporary botanical art depicting their native flora by their best botanical artists.

The New Zealand exhibition, opened in Auckland, before travelling to Wellington and Blenheim, proved that New Zealand has many talented botanical artists, some of whose work you see here today. Today we have society members in all corners of New Zealand. They are following in the footsteps of previous New Zealand botanical artists such as Sarah Featon, Fanny Osbourne latterly, and more Audrey Eagle, documenting all types of flora – native and exotic, large and small, the wellloved as well as those generally overlooked, bringing them to the public's attention through exhibitions such as the Botanica exhibition at the Welcome Swallow Gallery in Hamilton.

As our membership of the society continues to grow, so does public of important awareness our contribution to art. Our quarterly newsletter is sent to all members and apart from the most recent, is available to read on our website.

This year will see us start preparations for the next Botanical Art Worldwide exhibition. The theme, heritage crops and plant diversity, will have artists sourcing seeds to grow their chosen crop. Having the live plant material to draw from for at least one full growing season will allow our artists to show the whole plant cycle, depicting all or specifics from the pollen to the roots if they desire. We will travel the exhibition even further round New Zealand this time, so more people can view and appreciate this exacting art genre.
