

As the title of the exhibition suggests we are adding textiles, texture, tapestries and quilts to our more traditional fare of wall-hung art. The artists for this exhibition are, Louise Cook, Rainy Du, Marilyn Rea-Menzies, Anita Seddon and Joan Woodham.

threads of life demonstrates to us that the spinning of (a) yarn to make thread is in fact the basis of all storytelling and that through this rich medium, artists convey their insights and commentaries about the world around us. Accordingly, we have fashioned a superb 'woven space' that includes *inter alia* hand and machine pieced quilts, embellished embroidery, weaving and tapestries.

Adding to this, the art of Rainy Du, presents us with doorways, keyholes and 'zippers' that act as invitations to view the fabric of life.

The continuous thread or story that emerges integrates seamlessly across familiar art pieces that tell a story of life that the observer can self-sew and curate.

It is also apposite that the texture and warmth of many of the art pieces mitigates against some of the colder days that the New Zealand winter is capable of providing.

In this way, the pieces on display in the gallery are not only fine works of art they may also be fit for purpose in terms of warding off the winter chills.













Saori freestyle hand weaving fibre artist

Louise Cook, Saori freestyle hand weaving fibre artist. Threads of Life

Each of us has the responsibility to live our lives in the best way possible therefore, we need to establish a healthy life balance. Yes, for most of us, work is necessary and is possibly repetitive and stressful however, we must give ourselves time off to relax and recharge.

I have found the Japanese Saori freestyle weaving method to be very calming and beneficial to a weaver's emotional, mental and physical state.

Saori freestyle weaving is a style of fibre art whereby each weaver makes cloth from their heart.

I look upon the warp threads as my life's journey and the weft threads as the happenings that occur from day to day, year to year. When I weave, I am not consciously following another person's pattern rather, I am making decisions about colour and texture as I work.

I rarely weave with an end purpose in mind but enjoy the journey of freely making beautiful cloth working totally "in the moment".

Saori freestyle hand weaving is therapeutic, easy to learn, calming, and the weaver is in control of creating their own piece of cloth.

The only limit to the outcome is the weaver's imagination. No counting, no matching, no rules, no mistakes!

The Saori cloth you have woven is unique and is your own "Thread of Life".

Rainy Du

I am Rainy Du, an artist and graphic designer, now working and living in Hamilton.

My Chinese name is Yuchen Du. Yu(雨) means rainy, Chen (晨) means morning, which indicates I was born on a rainy morning (this is why I'm known as Rainy). So, I have a poetic existence. Here my life starts.

I've been trained how to draw very strictly since I was 9 years old. I spent a great amount of time on drawing. The whole process of observing and drawing has given me special and acute vision, which means I can find beauty differently and easily. At the same time, sensitivity and sentiment have also been integrated into my personality. I consider this as my destiny.

My major at the University of Waikato is graphic design, which means when I create work, I think in two ways, a graphic design way and a fine art way. These two perspectives do not conflict with each other. Instead they actually complement each other. Sometimes, the boundary between fine art and graphic design blurs. I think of art as a combination of beauty and communication.



Now I have been living in New Zealand for six years. My works are like threads of my life recording the changes that happened through time.

Marilyn Rea-Menzies

Throughout my working life as an artist I have often been inspired by nature. I was brought up on a dairy farm on the West Coast of the South Island of New Zealand and nature was very much an integral part of my life as a child. The first two years of my life were spent in the middle of the bush on the other side of the Buller River near Inangahua in the Buller Gorge. My dad was a bushman and we lived in a log cabin in a logging camp. Though I have no actual memories of this time in my life I am sure it has had a huge impact on how I view the natural environment around me.

I have always taken many, many photographs of plants, native New Zealand flora and fauna wherever I have lived or travelled and these images often form the starting point for my tapestries and paintings. I have a great love of our bird life and this was encouraged by my Nana who owned a copy of *Buller's Birds of New Zealand*. I spent many happy hours pouring over this book throughout my childhood. I enjoy feeding the birds each winter encouraging them into my garden and love watching their antics through my window and photographing them as inspiration for my work.

I am also fascinated by the small things of nature – the things that we do not see and often do not wish to see. Also, in finding beauty in what is normally perceived to be not beautiful or even ugly.

New Zealand native flowers are often very tiny, insignificant and barely noticeable. I enjoy taking them out of scale, enlarging them to try and capture their intricacies and beauty.

Anita Seddon

Born and raised in Sweden of Lapp decent, I met a kiwi while travelling in India. Love blossomed and New Zealand has been my home for over 30 years. My husband and I roamed the country, working here and there, living in campers, caravans and sailboats. We moved to Raglan 23 years ago and now with our son growing up here I can't see us moving anytime soon. I love the area and try to reflect that in my work, the harbour, coast, native birds and the bush.

The first quilt that I ever made combined velvets, satin (my graduation dress) and cotton prints, and was completely machine pieced and quilted. In those days (almost 50 years ago) the use of these unconventional fabrics and machine piecing and quilting tended to be frowned upon by traditional quilters. How times have changed!

With a National Certificate in Adult Education and Training, I have spent many years teaching Patchwork, Quilting and Sewing throughout the Hauraki/Thames Valley region, and in more recent years at Hillcrest High School in Hamilton. These classes included traditional and modern methods. All this was in addition to my day job!

A number of years as a member of the Auckland Quilters Guild provided endless inspiration as well as access to international tutors, and several of her works have won awards.

She continues to utilise unconventional fabrics, concentrating on unusual colour combinations and often adding hand embroidery and beading. Her children and grandchildren have all benefitted over the years, starting with baby quilts and progressing to larger ones which often used more conventional methods and fabrics combined with hand embroidery.



Joan is very pleased to take part in this exhibition and gives credit and thanks to her husband Peter and neighbour Jilly for encouraging her to display her work.
